# Waiting for your birthday

Waiting for your birthday is a bittersweet sensation for most of life. As a child, the year seemed to creep by at a glacial rate, and the last few days were pure agony; but, as an adult, with the years zipping by at a gallop, birthdays arrive with unseemly haste, leaving us all older, rounder and crinklier.

I suspect it is only the Nonagenarians and the Centenarians who have a triumphant approach to birthdays: another one ticked off is a poke in the eye for Father Time.

The bible is remarkably coy about birthdays. Perhaps this is because only rich people could afford birthdays, and certainly only the rich could afford a notable feast. How different from today when the words 'birthday' and 'party' fit together so nicely!

The four mentions of a birthday in the New International Version of the Bible are: when Pharaoh celebrates in Genesis in the stories about Joseph; Job's sons' birthdays are mentioned in the first chapter of that book; and, in the gospels of Matthew and Mark, on Herod's birthday, the daughter of Herodias asked for the head of John the Baptist on a plate – which must go down in history as the biggest party-pooper ever.

One celebration that is mentioned in great detail in the New Testament is, of course, the Feast of Pentecost, often called the church's birthday and, wow, what a party this turned out to be! The biblical narrative is found in the second chapter of the Book of Acts. Present at the time were about one hundred and twenty followers of Christ, including his closest group of disciples, his mother Mary and various other women disciples.

They had been told to 'stay in the city until they had been clothed with power from on high' (Luke 24: 49), and so they were 'all together in one place' (Acts 2:1), probably sharing food, goods, breaking bread and praying, when, suddenly, another guest arrived at the party. Like 'tongues as of fire', the third person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit, alighted upon them to give the promised power and, from that moment onwards, the fledgling church and the disciples were never the same again.

They went from a being a group of dispirited followers to a vibrant movement with anointed leaders who ministered with fresh authority and confidence. From that moment the church was born!

As with many people, the church has had good years, good choices and great times; but, as with everyone, there have also been terrible mistakes and people who have been hurt along the way. Perfection has never been possible, but honesty, humility and seeking forgiveness are as much a gift of the Holy Spirit as the ability to tell the world of the risen Christ. The Holy Spirit gave us all we need to live the life of Christian service: we just have to receive this gift and use it as Jesus has taught us – to love our neighbour as ourselves.

Pentecost this year isn't until June 8<sup>th</sup> – we'll have to wait a little longer for the party, but we will have services of celebration in all three church buildings. You are most welcome to join us.

# A note from the Editors

'And I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of life.' From this idea all creatures – including all of us – were born. It is a wonderful insight, revealed so clearly at Pentecost. In these days when atheism sometimes seems to be having the intellectual upper hand, who can resist the idea that there truly is an essence of life itself, giving meaning, free will, the power to react and cause action – and to love? The tangibility of the concept is a clear third of the way to our Trinity!

The biblical term for spirit is the Greek pneuma ('pneuma', as in 'pneumatic') literally meaning 'breath' – that which breathes life into the animal world (and by extension into creatures that do not breathe). 'Spirit' comes from the Latin 'spiritus', which has breathing-related derivatives 'inspire', and (eventually) 'ex[s]pire'. We still read (but don't always say) 'I believe in the Holy Ghost'. In fact, pneuma (without the adjective 'Holy') can also mean 'ghost'. In St Luke's account of the events after the empty tomb, the 11 and others hear the account of the two who met Jesus on the way to Emmaus. They then find Jesus to be among them, but think he is just a ghost – pneuma. Jesus corrects them. 'No, I am the Risen Christ, and no ghost' he tells them, and proves it.

At Pentecost, the power of the pneuma agia (Holy Spirit) really overflowed, giving power to speak many languages. A wonderful source of inspiration (yes, 'spiritus' again) for us all, Greek-speakers or no.







# Bible Society helps protestors in Ukraine

Hundreds of protestors in the Ukrainian capital Kiev have received food, drink, prayer support and copies of the Bible from local Bible Society staff during the recent anti-government protests there.

The General Secretary of the Ukrainian Bible Society, Oleksandr Babiychuk, said that people had responded "enthusiastically" to the Bible during the last few months. "The horrible events have forced people to turn to God," he said. 'We have been through some very difficult times, but God's Word has shone brightly.'

Bible Society workers and local church leaders had joined together to provide food, run a prayer tent and lead daily prayers. "During these difficult times, the public and protestors have been especially open to prayer and the Scriptures," said Mr. Babiychuk. "The tough situation has provided the Bible Society with a great opportunity."

He added that Bible Society was keen to help support people in the coming months as the country's situation remains unstable. "Many people have suffered, and many have relatives and friends who have been affected by the violence. Many people will need rehabilitation. That's where we come in. Bible Society is working on youth editions of

the Bible and large print editions for older people. We are committed to standing with these people to support them."

Imagine the hard work and trouble that must have caused because it was very rare for any woman to read and write at that time, let alone an unimportant countrywoman. Julian lived most of her life in a small room that joined onto one wall of St Julian's Church in Norwich. And you can actually visit the room (it was bombed during the Second World War but rebuilt).

Dame Julian wrote about the love of God and you can still read her book 'The Revelations of Divine Love' today. The book ends with the words "before God made us, he loved us". Before we were born, God chose us for the work we are to do. And as we know, God doesn't make mistakes. He chose you and me,

and he loves us. What a wonderful promise!


