The service was at our lovely St Martin's church, and it was a day of sunshine and showers, tears and happiness, with a Mother-of-the-Bride in a fabulous hat.

Finally, as Sunday arrived, we celebrated with another family as we welcomed little Ptolemy Hyslop into the Lord's family. He was baptised at St Martin's, surrounded by family and friends, and with the St Martin's congregation cheering him on. A new life with a whole future ahead of him.

Four very special occasions, within five days, and it is a real privilege to be a part of them all.

It is times like these, occasions of significance, when many people still turn to the church. The liturgy, music and symbols can help express deep emotions and bring meaning and colour to life's big events. This is nothing new: for millennia people have marked life's milestones with ceremony, and in the Winkfield and Cranbourne churches we do our best to make weddings, baptisms and funerals days of significance – a time to come before God, with family and friends, to give thanks and ask for his blessing on our lives.

Jesus knew about the moments in life that have to be marked as special. He was presented at the temple after he was born (Luke 2:22), he was a guest at a wedding in Cana (John 2:1), he celebrated when people made a decision to believe (Matthew 16:17), and he wept when they died (John 11:35). So ,if you find you have an occasion to celebrate this year, perhaps a life lived well, a birth, a commitment, or a marriage, know that, through faith, God will be with you as you laugh, cry and gather moments to remember.

### **Ascot Horticultural Society**

Peter Cleare writes: 'As I mentioned in my last contribution to these pages, this year we can look back 130 years to the earliest known record of a 'horticultural association' in the Ascot area. Meanwhile, on the national level, it is now 50 years since the launch of "Britain in Bloom" – a movement which has clearly done much to brighten cities, towns and villages throughout the country, and to enhance civic pride. To mark this anniversary, the Royal Horticultural Society, which now manages the campaign, has invited its affiliated groups to adorn their local public spaces with masses of glorious sunflowers in a concerted endeavour appropriately entitled "Growing for Gold". Ascot Horticultural Society will be playing its part. Last month seeds were sown in individual pots, some by members, and others by children present at the Winkfield May Fair. When sufficiently developed, the seedlings will be planted out alongside the recreation grounds at Winkfield Row and Cranbourne. In due course they should afford a host of bright yellow bee-friendly flowers.

'Of course, 2014 also sees the centenary of another and altogether more life-changing event, that of the start of the First World War. This has prompted us to ask: "What was life like in the farming, horticultural and food preparation industries a hundred years ago?"

'So, on 11<sup>th</sup> June, to address these questions, we are most privileged to welcome Jonathan Brown, who was formerly on the staff, and is now an honorary fellow of the Museum of English Rural Life at Reading. As a complement to the topic, members and visitors are invited to delve into their own family archives and attempt to prepare some "tasty treats from grandmother's cookbook".

'On 9th July, Brian Fisher, a frequent visitor whose own connections with our society go back to the early 1960s, makes a welcome return. This time he will be talking about "Grasses and Grass-effects Plants" - a

large ornamental group which divides opinion amongst gardeners, but which has undoubtedly gained popularity in recent years.

'On 13<sup>th</sup> August, we focus on "Roses" - indispensable features of the quintessential English garden - and who better to give information and advice on cultivation etc. than Mark Goold, the head rose grower at The Henry Street Nursery at Arborfield?

The annual Summer Show is pinnacle of the year for the Ascot Horticultural Society. This year it will take place on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> August, and, yet again, in the spacious and excellent surroundings of the Licensed Victuallers' School, London Road, Ascot. Doors open at 1pm. Besides horticulture, the show, as usual, includes classes for floral art, cookery, handicrafts and photography, and anyone, members and non-members of all ages, may submit entries. Full details can be found on the society web-site or by calling the Show Secretary on 01344 884637. In addition to the show benches many local organisations and traders will be present displaying their wares, interests and activities and there will be attractions and entertainment for children. In short, plenty for all the family so why not make it a date and come along.

### The Royal College of Organists

The Royal College of Organists was founded in 1864 by Richard Limpus, Organist of St Michael's Church, Cornhill in the city of London. It was granted a Royal Charter in 1893.

Over the following decades the College concentrated on the work of raising standards in the profession by developing and administering the College examinations, as well as steadily building the Library collection.

These activities were augmented in the 1980s with a new education and outreach strand, work which has since grown into what is known today as the RCO Academy programme. Together, RCO Academy, the College examinations, the Library and other activities help to ensure that the College continues to maintain the mission established by the founders all those years ago.

The 150th anniversary of the College, which has worldwide membership, falls this year and to celebrate this milestone, recitals are being given around the country and overseas. I will be giving one of these anniversary recitals at St Peter's Cranbourne on Saturday 28th June at 7:30pm. More about the recital can be found on page 3.

Another letter from the Vicar of a traditional country parish to his nephew Darren, a curate at a trendy urban church: on parish accounts, teapots and Labrador retrievers. (Thanks, Joan Doughty!)

My dear Nephew Darren,

Your annual accounts - all 146 pages, bound in their plastic covers and laid out in faultless detail - are really most impressive. I was rather envious to note you have a clergy "discretionary fund"; were I given such a thing, my cellar of claret would improve immeasurably - although that is perhaps the reason why I am not given one.

The size of your office expenses makes me wonder if you have a staff rivalling that of the European Community. I suppose that at least you are doing your bit for job creation. Our dear Miss Marigold, who spends two hours a week randomly filing pieces of paper, mistyping rotas and failing to re-order stationery, is 'only' rewarded by being the first to find out who are booking marriages and having their babies baptised - and if they do not happen in that order, that will be another piece of information remembered for future use. All this is information beyond the price of jewels in village communities.

Our accounts have more by way of charm than they do of accuracy, generally consisting of one sheet of handwritten paper. ### St ALBAN

St Alban, whose special day is 22<sup>nd</sup> June, was the first English martyr, the first English person to be killed for the Christian faith.

He lived in Verulamium, which was an important Roman settlement in Hertfordshire. At the time the Romans were persecuting followers of Jesus and Alban was brave enough to shelter a travelling Christian priest. Exchanging clothes with the priest so that he could escape, Alban was arrested.

When asked to prove his loyalty to Rome and the Emperor by making offerings to the

Roman gods, Alban declared his faith in 'the true and living God who created all things'. He was condemned to death and had his head cut off.

All this happened a long time ago but St Alban is remembered today in the name of the place where he lived and died: Verulamium was renamed the city of St Albans.
