A VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE Corridors of Power

I was very fortunate to be taken around the Palace of Westminster by someone who works within the glorious building. It was the most amazing afternoon. Our guide was effervescent with enthusiasm for Pugin and Barry's gothic masterpiece.

We saw both chambers, lurked by the dispatch box, admired Her Majesty's throne but, because this wasn't an official tour, we were also shown all the nooks and crannies that aren't usually on show; from antiquated cigar lighters to ordinary offices and the members' toilets. It was almost an overwhelming feast for the senses, both the sights and sounds of the building along with the resonance of history; but the place that struck me the most was, not the rich red of the Lords or the grand sight from the terrace, but the broom cupboard in St Mary Undercroft, the chapel of the Palace of Westminster. It was here that, on 2 April 1911, the night of the 1911 census, Emily Wilding Davison hid overnight so that, on the census form, this gutsy Suffragette could legitimately give her place of residence that night as the "House of Commons".

Mercifully this is still an ordinary cupboard: no one has prettified it or tried to make it a shire but Tony Benn MP did put up a plaque to mark the night when one ordinary person made a stand for a cause for which she was prepared to make the ultimate sacrifice.

I can't help wonder what Emily Davidson would make of the parliament we have today. Granted she may recognise the physical building but would she consider that power is now properly shared or is there work still to be done?

The feast of Pentecost (Whitsun) is behind us and we have celebrated the arrival of the Holy Spirit, God's power on earth. However this power was not given for legislation or laws, and – heaven forbid – it wasn't given to subjugate or oppress: rather it was given so that we could fulfil the greatest commandments of loving God: loving neighbours as ourselves.

And this power doesn't have to be won, no one has to be elected, and the Holy Spirit certainly isn't for the rich, the famous and those born to privilege. No. The Holy Spirit is for the ordinary people of the world so that they can live extraordinary lives of love and service.

Emily Wilding Davidson's gravestone bears the WSPU (suffragette) slogan, "Deeds not words" and – just think – if she could have walked down the corridors of power in a few years' time from now and entered the Chamber of the Lords, she might have been able see both a Queen and a woman bishop. Progress? I hope so. Is the work of equality now done? Definitely not. But I hope this would at least raise a wry smile.

A note from the Editors

The Vicar's article landed on our desk on Derby Day – and it was on Derby Day, 4th June 1913, that Emily Davison stepped in front of the King's horse at the Epsom Derby, sustaining fatal injuries. Even if she had not intended to endanger herself to that extent, as some theories have it, her passion and bravery for the Suffragette cause is truly remarkable. The story of Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the Suffragettes, is well told in Mark Hichens' book 'Women of Consequence' (reviewed in Winkfield Parish News for March 2014), and her chapter gives the story of Emily Davison's 'supreme sacrifice'.

In the lifetime of your Editors (well over 70 years, for those who are curious), huge changes have taken place in the education, status and achievements of women, and in the accepted broadening of their roles in society. Lady Mary Donaldson was the first-ever female Lord Mayor of the City of London in 1983, and the second female Lord Mayor, Fiona Woolf, is in office today. Women have proved successful in so many professions that used to be the province of men that it is hard to be very sympathetic to members of the male sex who opposed them!

Dame Ethel Smyth (1858-1944) was a distinguished composer, keen to fight the prejudices of the time – and she became a leading Suffragette herself, writing the anthem of the movement in 1911, and spending time in Holloway Prison for her activities for The Cause.

When the First World War broke out, Emmeline Pankhurst called off all Suffragette militancy, and was soon 'embroiled in the war effort', winning a 'Right to Work' campaign that allowed women to take on war work, releasing men for military service. A topical thought!

Yes, much remains to be done for the position of women in society, business and politics – but their cause continues and moves on.

All members agreed that the Harvest lunch should, again, take place in the Church. The date would be Sunday 14th September and this would be followed by a Harvest Evensong. Mary Knight requested an 11am Said Morning Prayer service on that day. This was agreed.

The speaker on 3rd June was Margaret-Anne Hodson, who talked about the Riding for the Disabled Association, known as the R.D.A. It is a national charity with 500 groups all over the country, each group being independent in running its own organisation in the best way possible, to help riders or drivers with disabilities.

Margaret-Anne runs the Warfield group, and offers riding to 25 riders each week during the school terms. The Warfield group is a founder member of the Association, which started in 1969. Margaret-Anne began as a helper in 1971 and has created several "firsts" for the Association. One was the first ever full-scale horse show in 1981 – for disabled people only – in a high profile place (Ascot racecourse). The dressage classes in this show led to dressage becoming a key competitive sport for disabled riders.

Margaret-Anne showed some of the awards that she had been given for her 42 years work for the RDA, and also some original photographs taken of the groups' riders in Windsor Great Park in 1978.

All members thoroughly enjoyed the presentation and Margaret-Anne took questions at the end.
