Thoughts of all sorts

The Parish Giving Scheme(PGS)

PGS was established in 17/3/2014 as a registered charity, constituted as a charitable company limited by guarantee, a not-for-profit organisation, to help improve the efficiency of fund-raising in the Diocese of Gloucester by automating the process of money collection withing church stewardship, including handling gift-aid claims. The current Bishop of Gloucester, the Rt Revd Rachel Treweek is the Chairman.

PGS now has an established office, and being an organisation dependent on internet and computer services for banking, fundraising and communications, has a the necessary up-to-date information - processing technology –equipment, services and human resources.

The ideas behind PGS were clearly of interest to other dioceses, and so other dioceses were enrolled as members, paying for the service by subscription. These subscriptions form the sole income to cover PGS administration, and amounted in 2019 to about 1.5% of the church income raised.

The 2019 Annual Report, recorded 30 diocesan members, one of which is, of course, our own diocese, Oxford, as member number 20. The number is expanding.

Because members cover the costs, gifts and regular giving to a parish like Winkfield by parishioners using the scheme go 100% to the Parish accounts, and are enhanced by 100% of the 25% Gift Aid repaid by HMRC on the large percentage of eligible donors. One of the biggest attractions of the scheme from the parish treasurer viewpoint is that

Gift Aid administration is done entirely by PGS. Other big benefits are the automatic inflation-proofing of giving by donors who agree to this.

Ultimately, the cost of the service is paid for by the collective Parish Share for the diocese. The ratio of running costs to donations income as a whole is about half (for example) the fee for using the CAF Donate scheme used by the Friends of St Mary's Winkfield, and also of Charities established to process fund-raising schemes. The office costs of the charity seem reasonable and not extravagant, and the management and auditing arrangements give confidence that using the charities service do not add risks to donors or our parish as a user of the scheme.

God in the Sciences

This is part of a series written by Dr Ruth M Bancewicz, who is Church Engagement Director at The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion in Cambridge. Ruth writes on the positive relationship between Science and Christian faith.

Science and Society: How Can We Approach New Ethical Issues?

Science tells us how the world works, and technology offers applications of that knowledge, but neither can tell us what we *ought* to do. All scientific discoveries or new technologies can be used to either help or harm others. For example, a smartphone can be used to stay in touch but also enables bullying.

It is important to get past our initial reactions: the 'yuk!' or 'wow!' These feelings may well change once we learn more about the science and other factors behind a new development.

Ethical thinking can be divided into three main categories. The **consequentialist** approach is demonstrated in Proverbs, when Wisdom calls young men to consider the outcome of their actions. Utilitarianism is a form of consequentialist ethic that tries to maximise the greatest good for the largest number of people affected, but unchecked it leaves minorities out in the cold.

Duty or law-based ethics start with intrinsic values, asking what is the correct course of action, or our duty? These values might be God-given, such as the ten commandments, or worked out by human reason. It is possible, however, to do harm while obeying the law, especially if someone asks 'What can I get away with?' Also, what happens when

rules collide? For example, who should be treated first when resources are limited?

Virtue ethics are about building character, growing in wisdom and the fruit of the Spirit. There are plenty of biblical principles to guide virtuous living, such as the idea that we are 'made in the image of God' which supports the value of every human life (e.g., Genesis 1:26–27, Genesis 9:6, James 3:9–10), but the right decision can vary depending on circumstances

So how can we make ethical decisions about new technologies? **The five Cs** bring together a number of different types of ethical thinking into a helpful framework for decision-making.

Clarify the facts and key questions.

Consider our choices: what could we achieve?

Constraints: External - what must we do?:

Internal - how should we behave?

Compare the pros and cons of each approach.

Choose what is best, with all parties in mind.

Finally, we have to recognise that the information available to us will change over time, our knowledge of God and His word will keep growing, and we cannot avoid making mistakes - so our ethical decisions will need to be revisited and revised from time to time.

The Holy Spirit and Science

Nobody knows exactly what free will really is. For many years people believed that science was nothing more than cause and effect – and that <u>denies</u> free will – just as it denies God a means to alter what happens.

Modern science has been forced to acknowledge that God created a clever way to avoid pure cause and effect. We know that quantum mechanics enables events to be affected by the observer of an 'experiment'.

Human beings can be thought of as physical systems, and, by the application of purpose, form both the experimenter and the subject of the experiment, and from this difficult concept comes (in some mysterious way) free will and the formulation of free thought.

The Holy Spirit is surely also the worker of experiments, and can therefore affect what we think and how we think it, as well as what happens in larger-scale physics. It is at the core of all life.

An interesting life – part 4 Sydney and romance for Harry

A great Empire conference tour for the Round Table in 1932/33 took my father, Harry, with other delegates, to the USA, then on to New Zealand and finally to Canberra, capital city of Australia. After the work on Empire policy was done, the plan was for the English delegates to relax in Sydney, Australia for a few weeks, being looked after by senior Sydney people, including the 'top people in society' in that city,

Sydney society took Harry and his fellow conference-delegates to their hearts, and this included introducing them to the Three Margarets, the prettiest young socialites in town: Margaret Fairfax, Margaret Honey and Margaret Vyner.

Soon Harry Hodson was able to invite Miss Honey to lunch - and she accepted.

After a few weeks, Harry asked Margaret Honey to marry him. Like a good girl she said she must ask her mother, who in turn very properly said: "Don't talk nonsense. Say goodnight to Harry and send him home," which she obediently did. The following day, he rang Margaret to say that, in the cold light of day, he still felt the same, but the answer was still no.

The stay in Sydney was over, and Harry travelled by train to Brisbane to prepare for his return by ship for the first leg of the long journey home. He wrote that in Brisbane "I received a message asking me to telephone Miss Honey; she told me that she had changed her mind and that she was coming to Brisbane, with her mother and stepfather and aunt, on the night train, to marry me."

Harry spoke to the priest of a local church, who told him: "You can't get married tomorrow: it's Lent – you'd need permission from the Bishop."

THE ceremony, which was very quiet, was performed by Rev. Father R. F. Bates at all Saints' Church of England. Mrs Byron Beans giving her daughter away.

NEW NOTE

The wedding frock of rose pink flamisol struck a new note with its definitely low waistline, swathed bodice and full sleeves. The bride wore a turban of the same material, and carried a shower bouquet of frangipanni and tuberdecs.

Doctor T. P. Fry, who knew the bridegroom at Oxford, was best man.

Mrs Beans chose black riboulding, relieved with white satin and a swathed black turban. She entertained afterwards at Lennon's Hotel.

Mr. and Mrs. Hodson will sail tomorrow morning by the Nieuw Zeeland, en route for England.

RAPID ROMANCE

Their romance began only three weeks ago, when they met at the Hotel Australia on the eve of the bride's 20th birthday. The couple only became engaged late last Sunday and decided to be married almost immediately.

The bridegroom, who is the son of Professor Hodson, of Cambridge University, is a fellow of All Souls' Oxford, and an economist. His recent tour of Australia was in connection with the "Round Table," of which he is sub-editor.

Sydney Daily Telegraph 29 March 1933

"What's his telephone number?" he responded. The Bishop gave his permission, and the short

notice was no problem in Australia – the outback culture had no time for banns to be read.

Margaret and her mother and stepfather had their luggage loaded on the train for Brisbane, and were enjoying a goodbye party on the platform with friends – when one of them,

seeing a train slowly chuffing

out of the station, said "isn't that your train leaving? – we must have been on in the wrong platform." Said another: "Quick, I have a fast car; jump in, and we'll catch the train up at its next stop". Questions were asked later as to whether the Governor General of New South Wales had been asked to hold the train up so that the wedding party could join the train and their luggage. But, whatever the answer, the fast car journey was successful, and they caught the train, which delivered Margaret and the rest of her family safely to their destination – Brisbane.

And so, it was that on 28/3/1933 Margaret and Harry were married in a Brisbane church. The following day they boarded the ship at Brisbane. The event was reported with enthusiasm in the Sydney Daily telegraph (see replica of the report above).

Harry's old Oxford friend Ivison Macadam (later my Godfather) was there, and he recalled that Harry actually carried Margaret onto the ship, to start the long voyage home.


Harry made a good choice for marriage, and so did Margaret, and they both led productive lives together, until my father died, almost 66 years later, on 27/3/1999. Their first child, Nicholas Jeremy was born on 23 June 1934, and I, Anthony Edward, followed a discreet thousand days later, in April 1937. Daniel followed in 1944 and Henry Charles in 1955.


