A message from the Interim Minister

Has the future got the church?



The Church should never be a ‘strange building’ in a neighbourhood. Rather, it is supposed to be an ‘oasis in the desert’ of every neighbourhood, deeply connected to our communities, comforting, and challenging us in our life troubles and foibles. The Church is, and always will be, a body of growing people who meet for fellowship and worship and encourage each other to live and preach the gospel of Christ’s love – and to love and look after one another. You are the Church.

However, such a refreshing oasis does not descend from the heavens. It takes prayer, effort, and treasure; sometimes even blood, sweat and tears, as with martyrs in the past. It took the founder his own death and resurrection to set it in motion.

In our baptismal and communion vows we take oaths to follow and serve Christ whatever the cost. For centuries we have built and proudly looked after our village and parish churches using all the treasures and strength. Our loved ones are buried there, and we were baptised, confirmed, and even married in there.

Sadly, for many, this need to belong to and even attend a church has been lost in the maze of life. It seems to have become irrelevant—with our busy lives. Even provision of online services during lockdown, the church has continued to struggle with membership and attendance, especially of the younger generation. The older more committed members are gradually becoming less able to volunteer for all that needs doing to keep the church flourishing.

Some Sociologists identify this condition as the ‘80/20 syndrome’. This means a small percentage of the members (20 percent) shoulder the work with their time, energy, and finances, while 80 percent remain as

mere spectators. When these spectators are dissatisfied, instead of pitching in, they run to where things are already hunky dory. Football fans, who stick with their team through thick and thin seem more loyal than these spectators.

Building and maintaining a flourishing and refreshing church requires participation from everybody; It requires your time; it requires your effort, and it requires your regular offerings and donations.

Our monthly Parish expenditures need your £50 a month or £100 a month or £200 a month – or whatever you are enabled and are willing to give. I say this openly because there are speculations that the deficits in the Diocese mean that some of our churches may close, and we have been identified as the weakest link in this Deanery.

We must urgently show our capability of meeting the challenge.

Vacancy as Clerk to The Trustees of the Winkfield Parochial Charity

A vacancy is arising for a clerk to the Trustees of the Winkfield Parochial Charity.

Our Charity owns 11 properties in Winkfield next the St Mary's church including 8 Almshouses, a school hall and 2 cottages.

The role of clerk includes liaising with our residents and tenants to ensure any property related issues are rectified quickly and ensure our regular maintenance contracts are carried out effectively. The clerk will report to the Trustees and take minutes of our meetings which occur 3 to 4 times a year. In addition, the clerk is responsible for maintaining the financial records of the charity which are audited by a local accountant, and jointly making payments on the charity's behalf with a Trustee.

The role is flexible, mainly working from home, but will require visits to the charity's premises. It is rewarding as it enables the individual to help

out a local charity, in addition to the solving of property related issues. A modest monthly payment is available to the individual.

Thoughts of all sorts

An interesting life – part 5: Approaching the 2nd World War

The previous instalment told how, after a short romance at the end of a conference tour in Sydney, Australia, Harry Hodson married my mother,

Margaret Honey, just before leaving (with her) for the long voyage home by ship in April 1933, visiting interesting places like Java and Ceylon on the way back. See www.fosmw.com/parishmag/an-interesting-life.pdf

Approaching the 2nd World War

Back in England, my parents soon settled in the small terrace house near Paddington in which I was born four years later. The world of influential people with whom he worked were impressed by the capable and intelligent wife that he had brought back to England, and who brought charm and grace to his life. We do not know how many young ladies were disappointed by his now being a married man - but he had been on the social list of eligible young bachelors.

Margaret was no intellectual, as my grandparents had expected of a wife for their brilliant son, but they made a great team.

In June 1934, my big brother Jeremy (as he was then called) was born. I appeared in April 1937, just before the Coronation of King George VI. My first memories of Jeremy were of a strong-minded 5-year-old, much bigger than me, who could be very angry. When this happened, I soon learned that quick flight was essential, even when my beloved mother was close by to give a safe haven. At other times, he was a close friend. At 7, he firmly became 'Nicholas' (his first name) or just 'Nick', and that was that: he allowed no argument!

Harry Hodson remained with the Round Table magazine and the movement that it supported, until the outbreak of war in 1939, taking over the full editorship of it in 1934, when John Dove, his predecessor, died.

His international work continued, visiting North America (particularly Canada) for conferences, and in 1938 he took part in a big Commonwealth Relations conference. This was a strange time, when the true face of Nazism, and the possibility of war were becoming apparent, but at the time of the conference there was no feeling of panic - and, of course, the German invasion of Czechoslovakia, which began the final slide into World War II, was an event happening in a totally different world to that of most Commonwealth countries.

When Harry was away on conference in 1938 - they covered months - my mother Margaret went (by ship) to Australia to see her mother,

Flora Byron Beans, always known as 'Mudder' and her formidable (but delightful) aunt Ethel Houghton, always known as 'Auntis', taking with her her two young children Jeremy aged 4, and myself, aged 1. Needless to say, I have no recollection at all of this adventure.

However, soon after his return to England, Harry was coopted into the newly formed Ministry of Information, deemed, with war impending, an essential part of the maintenance of morale both home and abroad by the control of news and propaganda. His knowledge of the British overseas countries and his journalistic skills made him a key player.

The family stay in North Aston to avoid London bombing after war came in 1939 was described in the 2nd episode of this story.

My father was never really happy in the Ministry of Information, and was uncomfortable as a non-combatant, even though he served in the Home Guard (when the day's work was done) on Air Raid duty. This gave him raw first-hand experience of the horror of London under German bombing attacks.

After the fall of France in August 1940, at the request of my mother's family in Australia, my mother, brother Jeremy and I sailed for safety to Sydney. My father moved to London, staying with his old friend Ivison Macadam, whose American wife and children were now in the USA.

My father was considering leaving the Ministry of Information to join the RAF when in 1941 he was offered the post of Reforms Commissioner in India. This post entailed helping the Viceroy formulate plans for India's future self-government. (As it turned out, Independence took place, in debatable haste, in 1947, earlier than anticipated.) His wife and children would join him there.

So Harry left for India by ship using a diversionary route to avoid German submarines. My father wrote: "On a late winter day in 1941, we sailed from Liverpool for Bombay in an elderly Blue Funnel passenger ship. She set off towards the north of Scotland, passed not far from Greenland, then turned southward to the west of the Azores, and in the South Atlantic made a rendezvous with an armed merchant cruiser, the first ship we had seen since leaving the coast of Britain. She sailed alone through enemy-infested waters. The able-bodied passengers, at the captain's request, formed a rota to stand watch on the after-deck,

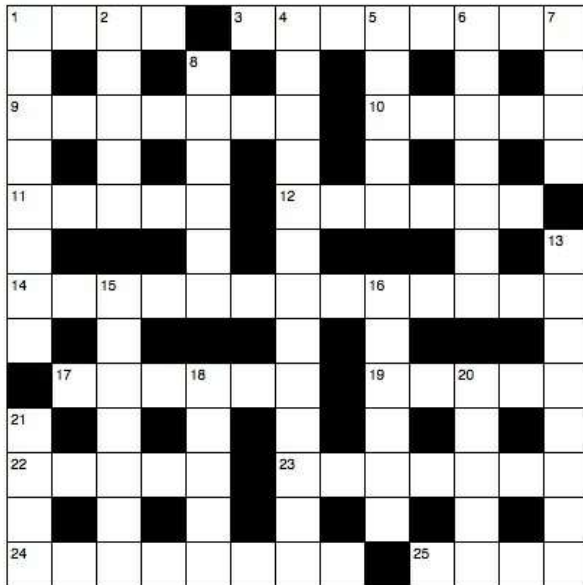
looking out for submarines." No less than 26 Blue Funnel ships were torpedoed and sunk during the war.

Soon after he arrived in India, my father was able to arrange that Margaret and the children should join him, so the three of us said goodbye to Mudder and Auntis, and travelled to Calcutta where we were met by my father. This required a six-day journey by flying boat. The next instalment will cover my many memories of these times.

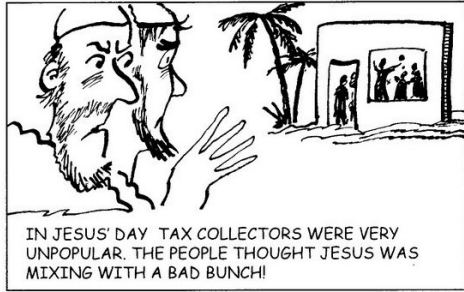
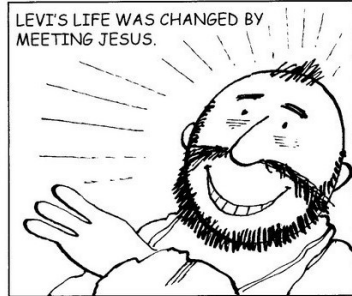
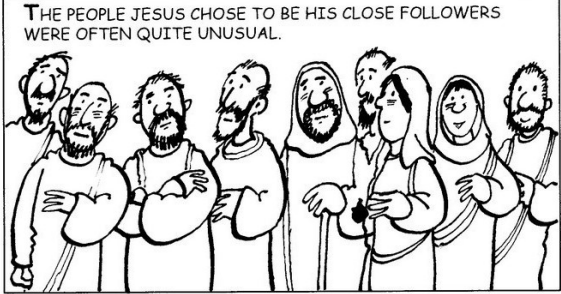
