Christmas: The Heart of Sharing, goodwill and peace

Christmas is a testimony that 2000 years ago God ventured into our tiny planet to transform humans from a self-destructive path. The birth of Jesus Christ has had a deep impact and influence on our world. So great is the impact, that time itself is divided as Before Christ and After Christ.

My prayer is that we will welcome the true spirit of Christmas and become the channels for worldwide peace, and go beyond mere self-indulgence this season, to discover true and lasting peace and joy by reaching out to others around and beyond us. Then the Prince of Peace can say that it is truly a happy Christmas, and we will continue to prayerfully sing the Carol, 'In the Bleak mid-Winter':

"What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb, If I were a wise man I would do my part, Yet what I can I give Him, give my heart."

Merry Christmas and a fresh horizons in the New Year.



The Berkshire Recorder Consort at St Peters 10December



Thoughts of all sorts

21 December - the Winter Solstice

A Midwinter festival has been a part of life since pre-Christian times. When the hours of daylight are fewest, the warmth of the sun weakest, and life itself seemingly at a standstill, our ancestors, the pagan peoples of Europe and Western Asia, kept festival by lighting bonfires and decorating their buildings with evergreens.

Perhaps they believed that the dying sun could be enheartened by fire, and the life of the buried seed assured by the presence of evergreen branches.

With the advent of Christianity, the Spring gods became identified with Christ, and the birthday of the sun with the birthday of the Light of the World.

The early church father Tertullian did not approve of Christmas decorations. "Let those who have no light in themselves light candles!... You are the light of the world, you are the tree ever green...." But by the time of St Gregory and St Augustine, four centuries later, this had changed. Pope Gregory instructed Augustine not to worry about harmless outward customs, as long as the right God be worshipped through them. And so many Anglo-Saxon customs were never discarded, but simply endowed with a new significance.

By 1598 one John Stow of London wrote how: 'Against the feast of Christmas, every man's house, as also their parish churches, were decked with holme, ivie, bayes, and whatsoever the season of the yeare afforded to be greene.'

Episode 22 - National Service in the Royal Navy 1955

My youngest brother Charles was born at home in Bourton House on 20 July 1955 (in those days, being born at home was quite usual – I had been born at home at 14A Westbourne Terrace, Paddington, as had my big brother Nick). Charles was christened on Sunday 4 September 1955.

The following day I had instructions from Her Majesty's Navy to present myself to Victoria Barracks, Portsmouth, to start two long years of National Service. So I paid a fond farewell to my dear family at Moreton-in-Marsh station, and set out all on an early train, full of apprehension at a long life-

journey into the complete unknown. I cannot remember the train-journey itself, but when I arrived at the barracks, I found myself just one of several hundred brand new Navy recruits. They came from all over the country, and from all backgrounds; regional accents were the norm, and my 'upper class' accent stood out like a sore thumb (although there were a few young men with similar middle-class backgrounds). I soon earned the nickname Clarence, which I didn't much like. My family were liberal-minded professional middle-class, and I had not learned snobbery at Eton. I didn't like the implications of the label; but it was there and it stayed, and I had to live with it.

We recruits were organised into 'messes' of perhaps 30, and there I began a process of social assimilation with boys of my age from all walks of life. They were young people just like me, generally friendly and tolerant, and I have no negative memories, although some of the tales they told about their home lives, particularly about relationships with women, were jawdropping — experience beyond my furthest contemplation.

At Victorian barracks, we were given full indoctrination into the way in which the Navy worked. I was interviewed for the possibility of a National Service Commission, but I was not accepted at that stage; it was nearly a year later before an opportunity to become an officer came again in my direction. So there I was, Ordinary Seaman Anthony Hodson, 954534. We were issued full naval kit, which included uniform and other items of clothing for work and ceremonial occasions, new polished shoes, a hammock pack that accompanied me everywhere, and other important things, like a 'housewife': a little bag full of things like needle and thread, for making repairs to one's clothes and uniform. I remember a lecture on personal hygiene, which was particularly aimed at people who had never owned a toothbrush in their lives. And there was 'square-bashing'.

We were also trained in many aspects of seamanship, some familiar to a boy with sailing background. New, however, was serious instruction in ABCD, dealing with dangers to RN ships in warfare. 'A' stood for Atomic Warfare, and included training in radiation and radioactive fallout. This would be relevant to my first ship HMS Diana, to which I was posted before Christmas. B stood for Biological Warfare; C stood for Chemical Warfare; D stood for Damage Control, meaning ad hoc repair of a ship damaged in warfare.


After about a month, we Navy recruits were sent to sea on HMS Theseus, an aircraft carrier converted to be a training ship. The ship set out, trainees

and all, to the island of Cyprus, where we delivered army vehicles and equipment to help the army in Cyprus cope with the EOKA 1955 uprising. Theseus experiences will await the next episode.
